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Managing Director's review

COMMITMENT TO QUALITY. Commitment to quality and customer service is total. The continuing high level of investment clearly shows our determination to bring about immediate improvements in service, while at the same time meeting all licence obligations and environmental standards within agreed timescales.

Key achievements during the year, the first full year since privatisation, were:

- In 1990/91 we invested £395 million, a 50 per cent increase
 on the previous year. Our investment programme, in excess of
 £4,000 million over a ten year period, is being successfully
 managed, and is on schedule and within budget.
- Our charges for water supply are the lowest of the ten
 privatised companies, and for all services the second lowest.
 This has been achieved inspite of us having no sea outlets for
 sewage sludge disposal. Over half our sewage sludge is
 returned to the land as a valuable fertiliser.
- We are currently replacing or relining some 1,500 kilometres
 of drinking water mains twice as much as in the last year
 before privatisation. Some 107,000 properties benefited during
 the year from this work. In addition, lead service pipes were
 removed from 10,000 properties over and above those dealt
 with during normal mains improvement work.
- We have made significant progress in improving drinking
 water quality. We are on target to meet the higher standards set
 in Europe, within the timescales agreed by the Government.
 Design work to improve treatment processes at our major water
 supply works has largely been completed.
- Bacteriological and chemical standards achieved have been the highest ever.
- We had no hose-pipe bans last year, despite it being the hottest and driest summer on record. However, recent weather

- trends, coupled with the impact of construction work on treatment works capacity, will bring our capability to meet all demands under increasing pressure. We are, therefore, supplementing our existing conservation and resource management measures with new leakage control initiatives.
- Major investment in sewage treatment facilities means that 97
 per cent of our major works complied with their sanitary
 consents during the year. We are confident that all works will
 be brought up to 100 per cent compliance during the current
 year.
- The number of buildings at risk from sewage flooding fell by more than twice the targeted amount and we have maintained good progress in alleviating sewage overflows.
- New technologies and systems have greatly helped our staff to deal with customer complaints and contacts. Over 99 per cent... are dealt with within 20 days and we are working towards our declared objective of dealing with 90 per cent of billing queries in less than 10 days.

No one at Severn Trent Water is complacent about the future and the challenges which will continue to face us for some time to come. However, the past year has brought very real benefits to thousands of our costomers, and has provided a solid foundation from which to build.

We are involved in a process of culture change which is destined to allow our people greater freedom in meeting the needs of customers. There are many positive results to be seen from the first stages of this process – it is a road on which there can be no turning back.

SEVERN TRENT WATER LIMITED DIRECTORS REPORT Year ended 31 March 1991

The Director present their report together with the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 1991.

Principal activities

The principal activities of the Company are the supply of water and the treatment and disposal of sewage.

Business review

The Company's turnover in 1990/91 was £608.6 million. Operating profit was £200.6 million. Profit on ordinary activities after interest was £246.9 million. The retained profit will be used to help fund our major investment programme, which increased by 50% over the previous year. This investment has helped the Company to achieve record levels of compliance with the high bacteriological and chemical standards for drinking water. Similarly, compliance with consent standards for discharges from sewage works is standing at its highest level. The Company continues to dispose of sewage sludge in accordance with our legal and environmental requirements.

The Company maintained its record - the minth year in succession - of productive improvements despite targeting increased resources for environmental and customer care initiatives. New systems to assist staff dealing with customers are already helping to reduce response times and provide better services.

A complete review of the Company's activities is contained within the Annual Report and Accounts of Severn Trent Plc. A copy of this report can be obtained on written request to the Director of Corporate Communications at the address given on page 1. There is no charge for this publication.

Future developments

The Company's commitment to quality is total. Investment will continue in bringing our drinking water treatment plants up to the highest standards, which are at least consistent with those set by Government and the European Community. Water mains are being improved at rates far in excess of those being achieved nationally, directly benefiting customers by enhancing the pressure, clarity and taste of our supplies. Continuing high investment in sewage treatment services to emphasise the Company's determination to meet all existing and new environmental standards. All sewage in Severn Trent is treated and the by-products are rendered harmless before being safely returned to the environment.

The Company is replacing overloaded sewers at a rate which will relieve more properties from the risk of flooding than at any time in the past.

Improvements in the service given in response to customers' enquiries and complaints will continue to be given high priority, by providing even better training for our staff and by making the latest technology available to them.

The absence of Government strictures on expenditure levels is enabling the Company to invest in immediate levels of service improvements and maintain assets to protect the long term interests of customers.

Dividend and reserves

Interim dividends of £80 million were paid during the year. A further interim dividend of £16 million was paid on 28 June 1991. Proposed transfers to reserves are set out in note 17 to the Financial Statements on page 27.

Post balance sheet events

Since 1 April 1991, the following funding arrangements have been put in place:-

- a) £100 million variable rate leasing facility
- b) £100 billion Lira in fixed rate loans (6 years and 9 years), from the European Investment Bank, swapped into £46 million fully hedged floating rate sterling loans.

Fixed assets

The changes in tangible fixed assets during the year are shown in note 9 to the financial statements on pages 20 to 22.

Research and development

The Company has a positive view of research and development. It is directing investment into those areas which can contribute to continuing improvements in operational efficiency and the achievement of national and international standards of potable water, sewage effluent and sewage sludge.

The Company is developing appropriate technologies, captured from throughout the world, to meet these objectives. The aim is successfully to apply these technologies to the water business.

Disabled persons

The Company has a policy of employing disabled people in suitable posts and of making arrangements, whenever possible, to encourage employees who develop a disability to continue working within the Company.

Health and safety

The Company has continued to improve its health and safety record with a continuing commitment to provide a healthy and safe working environment and by continuing to reduce the numbers of reportable accidents. The Company has once again received a British Safety Council Award for its safety record during 1990. Close liaison with the Health and Safety Executive continues and regular safety audits are carried out within the Company. Safety training continues to have a high priority in all areas.

Employees

The number of people working for the Company at 31 March 1991 was 7,182 (1990, 6,986) During the course of the year, much work has been undertaken in the management development areas through both the assessment centres which we run in-house, and the development programmes which have been designed. Over 25 senior employees attended business schools such as Harvard, Henley, Sunbridge Park, Ashridge and London Business School.

We continue to run within the Company our own BTec courses on operational management, reclamation and pollution control, water supply and distribution, and City & Guild courses.

We recruited 32 graduates who commenced with us during 1990, in the fields of operations, computing, engineering and accountancy.

Our consultative arrangements with employees continue both at Company and district/departmental level and the negotiating machinery which was established in 1989 is now functioning satisfactorily.

"Ring fencing"

As at 31 March 1991 the Company had available to it sufficient rights and assets which would enable a special administrator to manage the affairs, business and property of the Company in order that the purposes of a special administration order could be achieved if such an order were made.

Auditors

A resolution proposing the re-appointment of Price Waterhouse as auditors will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting convention

The financial information has been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards except as indicated in note f) below.

b) Basis of preparation

The accounting statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements contained in Condition "F" of the Instrument of Appointment of the Water and Sewerage Undertakers. The supplementary current cost financial information will be published reparately and be available by 30 September 1991 in accordance with quidelines issued by the Office of Water Services.

c) <u>Turnover</u>

Turnover represents the income receivable in the ordinary course of business for services provided.

d) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets comprise:

Infrastructure assets (being mains and sewers, impounding and pumped raw water storage reservoirs, dams and sludge pipe lines); and

Other assets (including properties, overground plant and equipment).

i) Infrastructure assets

Infrastructure assets comprise a network of systems:

Expenditure on infrastructure assets relating to increases in capacity or enhancements of the network is treated as additions which are included at cost after deducting grants and contributions.

Expenditure on maintaining the operating capability of the network in accordance with defined standards of service is charged as an operating cost.

No depreciation is charged on infrastructure assets because the network of systems is required to be maintained in perpetuity and therefore has no finite economic life.

ii) Other assets

Other assets are included at cost less accumulated depreciation. Additions are included at cost.

Freehold land is not depreciated. Other assets are depreciated evenly over their estimated economic lives, which are principally as follows:-

Buildings 30-60 years Operational structures 40-80 years Fixed plant 20-40 years Vehicles, mobile plant and computers 3-10 years

Assets in the course of construction are not depreciated until commissioning.

iii) Leased assets

Where assets are financed by leasing arrangements which transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset to the lessee (finance leases), the assets are treated as if they had been purchased and the corresponding capital cost is shown as an obligation to the lessor. Leasing payments are treated as consisting of a capital element and finance costs, the capital element reducing the obligation to the lessor and the finance charges being written off to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease in reducing amounts in relation to the written down amount. The assets are depreciated over the shorter of their estimated useful lives and the lease periods.

All other leases are regarded as operating leases. Rental costs arising under operating leases are expensed in the year they are incurred.

e) Infrastructure renewals accounting

The charge for infrastructure renewals expenditure takes account of planned expenditure on maintaining the operating capability of infrastructure assets in accordance with the operational policies and standards underlying the "K" Investment Programme, and reflects the impact of price changes by indexation since the programme was prepared. The timing of the "K" Investment Programme and other operational considerations may result in uneven patterns of infrastructure renewals expenditure. Charges to the profit and loss account are adjusted by way of accruals or deferrals, as appropriate, to take account of any significant fluctuations in actual or planned expenditure.

f) Grants and Contributions

Grants and contributions received in respect of non infrastructure assets are treated as deferred credits and are transferred to profit and loss accounts in accordance with the asset lives of those assets.

Grants and contributions received relating to infrastructure assets have been deducted from the cost of fixed assets. These grants and contributions are a contribution towards capital expenditure which is intended to ensure that the cost of extending the infrastructure system does not fall upon customers generally. In the opinion of the directors the accounting treatment adopted is appropriate in order to show a true and fair view.

g) <u>Investments</u>

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less amounts written off. Those held as current assets are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

h) Stores and work in progress

Stores are stated at cost less any provision necessary to recognise damage and obsolescence. Work in progress is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes labour, materials, transport and an element of overheads.

i) Pension costs

Pension costs are determined actuarially so as to spread the cost of providing pension benefits over the estimated period of employees' pensionable service with the Company.

j) Foreign currency

All transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the actual rates of exchange ruling at the dates of the transactions. Foreign currency balances on which the exchange movements are covered are translated into sterling at the covered rates. Other foreign currency balances are translated at the rates ruling at the balance sheet date.

k) Research and development

Research and development expenditure is charged to the profit and loss account in the year in which it is incurred.

1) Deferred taxation

Deferred taxation relating to capital allowances and other timing differences is provided for to the extent that it is probable that a liability will crystallise. Deferred taxation is not provided for on timing differences where it is probable that a liability will not crystallise.

19 PENSIONS

The Company operates two schemes, the Severn Trent Mirror Image scheme (STMIS) and the Severn Trent Water Pensions Scheme (STWPS) both of which are of the defined benefit type and are fully funded to cover future salary and pension increases. The assets of the schemes are held in separate trustee administered funds.

An actuarial valuation of STWPS was carried out at 31 March 1989, using the attained age method.

The principal assumption used was that the investment return would exceed future salary and wages increases by 2% per annum.

The valuation showed that the market value of the schemes assets was £0.5 million, and that transfer values were expected from the Water Authorities Superannuation Fund (WASF) totalling £120.3 million in respect of scheme members at the valuation date, and together these represented 105% of the benefits accrued to members after allowing for expected future increase in earnings.

The actuary has recommended that contributions to both schemes may continue unchanged at the rates of 15.8% and 13.2% of pensionable pay of STMIS members paying contributions of 6% and 5% respectively and at the rate of 15.8%, 13.2% and 7.9% of pensionable pay of STWPS members paying contributions of 6%, 5% and 3% respectively.

The first actuarial valuation of STMIS takes place as at 31 March 1991.

Employers contributions to the funds during the year were £13.4 million (1990 £11.5 million).
